## Color lithography changed how people saw advertising

Throughout most of the 19th century, advertising was in its infancy and manufacturers had few options to present their products to the American population. There was no radio, mail was unreliable, and newspapers offered mundane options in black and white print. Most companies produced generic goods in nondescript packaging, and Americans brought their own containers to fill in their local store.

Advertising was transformed in the 1880s and 1890s when a spectacular breakthrough in printing technology made it possible to add color to lithography, opening the door to commercial advertising as we know it today. In conjunction with that, companies had to make their product packaging very colorful to attract more attention on the shelf, enticing the public to select their merchandise over the products of their competitors.


According to The Met, lithography was first invented around 1796 in Germany by an unknown Bavarian playwright, who accidentally discovered a way to print unlimited copies of his scripts by writing the words in a greasy crayon on slabs of limestone, and then printing them with rolled-on ink.

This set the stage for the next hundred years, when lithography was used to make advertising signs in many forms, including paper, tin, wood, and glass. Companies used the signs to market their wares in saloons and general stores, but their lacklustre image

Below: Reverse glass sign advertising The Rock Island Railroad, circa 1890. Sold for \$165,000.









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

## Exhibit explores Karl Martz, IU legacy

LAFAYETTE, Ind. — In 1945, following the end of World War II, Henry Hope began building the Fine Arts Department at Indiana University, Bloomington, and asked Karl Martz to create a ceramics program. Karl began teaching classes that fall, using an oil kiln and other equipment he had sold to the university in 1942 when he had to close his own pottery in Nashville, Ind., after seven productive years.



Karl was the only full-time ceramics instructor until 1973, when John Goodheart joined the faculty. When Karl retired in 1977, the I.U. Art Museum held a retrospective of his work, with 222 pieces in a wide range of styles and glazes. Tributes in Ceramics Monthly and the Journal of the AmericanArtPottery Association followed.

Now, 42 years later, a museum in Lafayette, Ind., (see related article below) has launched an exciting exhibit titled "Karl Martz and the Legacy of Indiana University Ceramics," continuing through

July 27. There are 129 pieces in the exhibit, all with a red I.U. on the label to distinguish them the from other numerous Indiana pottery pieces on display from the museum's collection.

In addition to the work of Karl and his wife Becky Brown dating back to the 1930s, the Haan Museum of Indiana Art has assembled the work of 27 other

ceramic artists for the exhibit. Six are past or present professors in the I.U. ceramics program, Bloomington, and 13 are MFA grads who became professors at other universities around the country. Five more are I.U. MFA grads who became successful independent ceramic artists.

The dominating piece on the center table as you enter the exhibit is a large unglazed stoneware pot with incised decoration by Karl Martz. It has been around. It won first prize at the Indiana Biennial Ceramics Exhibition, Herron Museum,

A white whale has been set free inside Kokomo's Foster Park, beckoning to passers-by along Wildcat Creek, urging them to stop and look and even step into its enormous, toothless jaw.

## Family turns Indiana focused collection into museum

LAFAYETTE, Ind. — The State of Connecticut Building from the 1904 St. Louis World's Fair was built to be disassembled and sold upon the fair's closure. Its buyer was William Potter and it was shipped by train to 920 State Street in Lafayette to became his family's residence.

Fast forward to 1984. Bob and Ellie Haan buy the huge house as their family home to raise their three sons. The mansion has three above-ground floors and a full basement totaling 15,000 square feet. It also includes a grand double staircase, seven fireplaces and five bathrooms.

Bob said they lived there for eight years before they started to renovate it. Around that time, he added, they started collecting art, quickly deciding to focus on Indiana artists. And as any collector in their shoes would do, they collected items from the 1904 World's Fair too.

Every Indiana art collector knows about T.C. Steele, the best known of the five artists that comprised the Hoosier Group. The Haan's have many Steeles and fine examples of the rest in the group: William Forsyth, Otto Stark, J. Ottis Adams and Richard Gruelle. But that's just a tiny part of their collection.

Once they narrowed their art collecting to Indiana artists they decided to have antique American furniture on display and choose mostly items from the Renaissance Revival period, 1860-1890.

In 2013, while they still lived in the building, they started offering tours as the



Indianapolis, 1955; and first prize at the first DePauw Ceramic Show, Greencastle, Ind., 1959. It was exhibited at the Martz Retrospective in 1977, on loan from the Museum of Contemporary Crafts of the American Crafts Council, NYC. It was sold at auction in 2008 when deaccessioned (along with many other great pieces of pottery); then later was purchased by the Haans. Welcome home.

Some of the other Karl Martz and Becky Brown pieces on display are on loan from their two sons, Eric Martz, Massachusetts, and Brian Martz, Wisconsin. Some are recent gifts from the brothers, and others were already part of the Haan Museum collection.

The exhibit started to come together last year when the Haans decided to do something to commemorate five years of collecting Indiana contem-

porary ceramics. Focusing on Karl Martz and the ceramics program at Indiana University seemed a natural. It was also a great opportunity, Bob remarked at the opening reception on May 3, to show that the Haan Museum is for the entire state and beyond, not just the Lafayette area.

Eric Martz expressed his delight and gratitude to the museum at the opening reception, and said he was especially pleased to see so many of his mother Becky Brown's pieces on display next to Karl's. "She's really very underappreciated." He shared that he had spent time at the Indianapolis Museum of Art the day before and was shown its single piece of Karl's work in basement storage. "And then I came out here and wow!" he said. "What a glorious thing Bob and Ellie have done to gather all these wonderful pieces and make them available. Obviously, they have filled a need in the State of Indiana."

ramics and furniture should be shared with the public.

"It's kind of like four museums in one," Ellie said in a recent interview with the Lafayette Journal & Courier. "Some people come and they're only interested in the architecture. 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## Antique toy show has deep roots in Michigan

Seventeen-year-old Jim Welytok was angry

He had asked a local antique show promoter about table space for an upcoming show and was told — in effect — "Listen kid, I don't need any more vendors. Scram."

The young Welytok – living in Milwaukee at the time, the capitol of American beer – didn't have a market for his old brewery pickings. So, he decided to start his own show.

"I joined the National Association of Breweriana and with their membership roster, I wrote letters to 300 collectors from Wisconsin, Illinois, Michigan and Minnesota," he said. "And I had a mass of flyers, posting them everywhere I could get permission – bars, liquor stores, signposts... just anywhere."

Six months later, the day of the show, there were 100 tables of vendors, and more than 1,000 people came through the door.

That was nearly 40 years ago, and Welytok hasn't looked back. Not only was Welytok's premiere event, The Brew City Advertising Show, the largest specialty show in a great part of the Midwest, but it also helped expand the now burgeoning breweriana marketplace.

"Back then, everyone was interested in cans," Welytok said. "I was always attracted to the advertising

signage. About that time, the beer companies were producing more sophisticated signs – like the Hamms' animated waterfall signs. That's what I was after. I bought every sign I could."

Today, however, Welytok, owner of Unique Events Show, is more focused on managing the 12 antique and collectible shows he hosts throughout the Midwest. "I never thought I'd end up in the show management business, but here I am," he says. Loving what you do, and being an inveterate collector, helps, he adds.

In Wisconsin, Unique Events hosts the Scale Auto Hobby & Toy Show and The Brew City Advertising and Rec Room Décor Show. In Illinois he sponsors The Countryside Collectors Classic Toy Show and The Tinley Park Annual Holiday Toy Show.

But the biggest of them all is the Kalamazoo Antique and Collectible Toy Show, one of the longest enduring and largest under-roof shows in the state of Michigan. The show, formerly known as Circus Maximus Kalamazoo, had developed a strong presence in the state for 27 years under the management of Bruce and Dee Dee Beimers. Welytok took over operation upon the Beimers' retirement about 10 years ago.

There were 370 vendor tables set up May 18 for the Kalamazoo Show, everything from early primitive to new toys for sale.

"You can find toys like your grandfather played with; or toys your kids can play with. You can buy items for \$1; you can buy items for \$1,000."

Long-time local vendor Sandy Johnson Barts, who specializes in vintage toys, dolls, Hot Wheels, Legos and other toys, said she always does well at the show.

"I did exceptionally well at this last show (May 18)," Barts, a retired registered nurse, said. "In the 15 years I've been coming here, I think this was my third highest sales volume."

Vendor Gary Ulm of Kendallville, Ind., also started selling at Kalamazoo about 15 years ago. "I was busy selling the whole show, from beginning to end," said Ulm. "It's always been a hobby for me...I started collecting toys about 30 years ago — It's not a full-time job, but it helps.

"I do about six shows a year, and I don't do any good if a promoter can't get the people through the door. But, that's one thing Jim does: He puts them through the door. That's why we keep coming back."

The fall Kalamazoo Antique and Collectible Toy Show is scheduled for Nov. 29-30.

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## Don't waste money on 1980s reproductions

I have a desk I just picked up. A friend who had an antique shop guesses it is a reproduction made by someone who moved to the United States from Europe and started producing them here. Any ideas who or




Above: This imitation Chippendale style desk was made in Southeast Asia of uncured wood and imported in the 1980s

This desk is a reproduction but not from a European cabinetmaker. It is from the great influx of reproductions from the 1980s from Malaysia made of uncured wood and quickly exported. As the wood cures over time it will crack and shrink dramatically. While the designs are quite good, copied and applied liberally from classical pieces, the hand work is sometimes clumsy and wood selection is subpar. Items of this provenance should not be confused with the genuine article and should be generally avoided.

I stumbled upon an article you wrote about Walter of Wabash and was wondering if you could offer some assistance. I believe I have one of the tables you referred to in your article in which he made the slides but not the table.

I am running into an issue and that is I am trying remove the top from the base but not sure what tool was use to put the tables together back then. Do you have any knowledge of this

It took me a minute but I got it. It is a combination of two screw heads, either of which should work. The first is a fairly large Phillips head that will fit the "crosses" in the screw head. The other is a number two square recess driver that will fit the square hole in the center.

Was Charles Knapp furniture built only in Wisconsin? I have a two-drawer dresser with pegged and scalloped drawers, and beautiful hardware. It is missing one pull.

Charles Knapp invented that type of drawer joinery but he was an inventor, not a manufacturer. He licensed his design to many manufacturers so your dresser could have been made almost anywhere but it was used mostly in the Northeast and Midwest.

I am hoping you can help me identify the make, year and value of the attached table-top writing desk. I have had inconsistent feedback on this piece. I was told it was from the late 1800s, 1940, it was sawn off of a larger piece and made into a table top and that it was possibly a Larkin. I have not been able to find one on Worthpoint, eBay, Google and other sites. I currently have it in my booth in a shop for \$200, but hoping to find the true value.





Your small desk is from the Golden Oak period of American furniture 1880-1920. 1900 would be a good guess. It is a counter top desk and would have been used in a retail store for quick customer service. A similar desk only in rolltop version that sold for \$250 at Rich Penn Auction in Iowa in 2013.

The market has changed dramatically since 2013 so your \$200 price may be a little high. Nice piece though.

Looking for info on a rocker received as a premium from Larkin Co. around 1903 or 1904. It belonged to my husband's grandmother. One part of the spring is broken, so I was considering getting it repaired. Also wanted to know

on the original. I want to replace the Naugahyde that had been used earlier.

My copy of the Larkin cata-A log skips from 1901 to 1908 so I do not have the earliest parts of the decade and your chair is not shown in later editions from 1908 onward. The chair is made of birch with a mahogany finish. That is called "simulated mahogany" and was correctly explained in the 1902 Sears catalog as being both stronger and less expensive than genuine mahogany. The chair is said to be a "press back" chair. The design in the back was not carved. It was made by the impression of a sharp steel die under great pressure that was rolled across the surface of the wood. The design was literally pressed into the wood. Face figures in the back of a chair like yours were very popular in

what kind of covering was used the late 19th and early 20th century. There were many German woodworkers in America at the time and some of the figures came from Black Forest mythology. Others came from Greek and Roman mythology. Some of the gargoyles and grotesques were from Gothic legends of the Middle Ages.

The choices of upholstery in Larkin, Sears and Montgomery Ward of this period were almost endless and was up to the customer. Choices included leather, imitation leather, silk damask, velour, corduroy and plain cotton. I suggest you use genuine leather if possible. Any good upholstery shop can fix the springs and supply the leather. What's broken in your chair is not the spring itself but the support frame around the entire spring unit. The upholsterer may have to replace all the springs.





fiberglass Willie debuted at the end of a lake in the Indianapolis Zoo's original East 30th Street location, according to the paper.

"It started off as a tropical fish tank that was in the mouth of it, and what they discovered was that fish were dying at a regular pace inside that fish tank because it got so hot," added Morris. Willie at one point even become a reptile exhibit, he noted.

"It was like a novelty, that if you went to the zoo at that time, the children's zoo, you had to have your picture taken there," said Morris. "It was like the main attraction, besides the animals."

The city zoo, which originally opened as a children's zoo, closed in 1987, re-opening one year later in White River State Park. Willie, despite the new zoo expanding to five times its original size, was left behind.

He later resurfaced at the Boogie Mountain water park near Shadeland Avenue and I-70, followed by a stint at the Fun Spot Amusement Park & Zoo in Angola, noted the Star.

It was then, before the Fun Spot lost its joy and closed in 2008, during the Great Recession, that Willie was painted black and given red lips, flashier eyes (including prominent eyelashes) and a more defined smile.

After the amusement park's closure, Willie

sat, beached, at his Angola home.

A picture taken during the whale's dark ages shows him cast before an abandoned water slide, brown weeds growing to nearly half his full height, obscuring the tail flip that once leapt out of the Indianapolis Zoo lake.

In 2015, Willie caught the attention of Rushville mayor Mike Pavey, and he was sold to the city "with intentions of making him a roadside attraction or piece of outdoor public art for the city," according to the Star, which, like it did for Kokomo officials, gave Pavey the idea of freeing Willie.

Kokomo at the time was also looking for "artistic" objects to place along its trail system, said Morris, but the city lost out to Rushville during its first attempt at Willie.

"We had some interest in (Willie), and we missed it," he explained, noting there were then five groups interested in the iconic stat-

So the whale began the next leg of his journey, heading to east-central Indiana.

"Willie the Whale was very popular when I was a kid; you went to the Indianapolis Zoo and you saw Willie," Pavey told the Rushville Republican in August 2015.

"Our thought was we figured Willie was going to be destroyed. I felt it could be crazy, but kind of fun. Everyone knows this whale in our age group, we all knew who he was as

kids."

In August 2016, Willie arrived at the Indianapolis Museum of Art "after a leisurely swim/drive from the City of Rushville," the museum posted on Facebook. There, Willie became a major attraction on the 18th hole of "Mini Golf at the IMA" as a temporary loan from Rushville.

It was during his time on the golf course, despite the city's previous swing-and-miss, that Willie's future in Kokomo was cemented.

Kokomo and Rushville, explained Morris, use the same agency to book the two cities' summer concert series events.

So when Morris traveled to Indianapolis to do the TV news rounds alongside Brian Sheehan, Rushville's director of special projects and community development, a trip meant to promote summer concerts led instead to a conversation about a whale.

"He'd been to Kokomo and knew that we had the praying mantis. We do like unusual art. Like it or not, we like unusual art," said

Sheehan asked Morris whether Kokomo would have any interest in Willie.

"He goes, 'We don't really know what we're going to do with it, we're talking about splitting it in half and putting it on the side of a building," recalled Morris. "I'm like, 'Man, really, is that the right thing do with it?"

"He goes, 'Well, if you're interested in it, we'd be more than happy to let you have it."

Morris and Kokomo Parks Superintendent Torrey Roe later drove to Rushville, and the city of Kokomo eventually bought Willie for \$10,000, which included transportation costs, in a deal completed in September 2018.

The city had by that time contracted with Justin Olson - who runs Olson Paint Studios in Indianapolis and painted the "Northern Indiana Supply Company Inc." seen on the north side of 306 Riverfront District - to restore Willie.

Olson said in an interview that Willie was in two pieces when his company received him, his tail completely detached, with five layers of paint.

It took nearly a week-and-a-half to prep Willie's body, said Olson, a process that included sanding and scraping and using a paint removal machine to prep the whale's surface for a new coat of white paint.

Wood was used to fortify Willie, to make it possible for him to be whole again. It took a month to get the whale back in shape and into one piece, Olson added.

"He was pretty beat up," he said. "He was a mess when we got him."

About the decision to have Willie painted white, his original color, Morris said: "It's kind of like having an antique car. Some people like them changed and some people like them original. It just feels right to be original."

Olson, meanwhile, held a personal connection to Willie.

The owner of a cottage on Lake James, Olson would drive by the whale when he was positioned at Fun Spot in Angola.

"I drove by for years and years," he said. "Small world."

Olson said he realized how much Willie meant to Hoosier history fanatics when he found a Facebook page dedicated to Indiana's past and saw hundreds of comments giving information about Willie and others requesting more.

"It was exciting," he said about restoring Willie. "We had a lot of people stop in while we were working on him that wanted to see him."

It is Olson's hope that Willie will be around for another 50 years, a goal he worked to reach by using "top notch" materials.

"I hope people want to get up and see him,"

A placard detailing Willie's history will soon be placed inside his jaw, showing the long, iconic journey that finally brought him

"It's great. He's a great addition," said Morris, who is on the hunt for pictures from city residents that they took with Willie when he was at the Indianapolis Zoo or another previous location.

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





## Poole pottery offered mid-century Art Deco designs

The Virtual Museum of Poole pottery reports, Poole Pottery "has more consistently reflected the spirit of its age, from the Art Deco designs of the 1920s to the 1930's to the clean modernist lines of the 1950s, than any other pottery, and, yet, Poole Pottery is not widely collected." However, in the last 20 years, collectors have begun to take notice of Poole Pottery and its mid-century, artistic ceramic ware.

Poole, county of Dorset, is a large coastal town on the south coast of England. With an abundance of red clay to the north and its natural harbor for shipping, Poole has long been a center for pottery production, beginning in 1873 when Jesse Carter bought a run-down tile manufacturing company that had been earlier established on Poole's quayside.

Carter rejuvenated the tile business, renaming it "Carter's Industrial Tile Manufactory," focusing production on ceramic tile and architectural accoutrements. Although Jesse founded the new company, it was his son, Owen Carter, who first developed the company's art pottery in the years just prior to World War I.

By 1920, Carter's Industrial Tile Manufactory was well on its way to being an important English decorative art, ceramic manufacturer, having hired James Radlev Young as its design artist and established an important working relationship with Omega Workshops. However, just as the company was climbing upward, Owen prematurely died, and his brother, Charles, took over the company, forming a partnership with Stoke-on-Trent potter John Adams

and silversmiths Harold Stabler and Phoebie Stabler, establishing "Carter Stabler Adams," a company known for its early Art Deco pottery.


Carter Stabler Adams eventually evolved into "Poole Pottery," and from the 1920s-1960s, rose to prominence, ushering in Poole Pottery's art pottery heyday. The company continued producing ceramic tile that was high in demand since Carter tile was used on most of London's Underground stations built in the 1930s.

One of the first lines of Poole Pottery that attracted collector attention was Traditional, which, during the 1920s, was primarily the work of chief designer Truda Carter Adams. Poole's Traditional wares were covered in a white slip and then dipped in a semi-matt clear gaze before being hand painted with floral and geometric designs. Every piece of Carter's Traditional wares was unique since "paintresses" took their designs, added their own individuality to the designs, and handmade and hand painted all of the pieces.

Following World War II, Poole Pottery, with a seemingly 80-year "overnight" success, burst upon the pottery scene with its easily recognizable and highly sought after Art Deco pottery, which quickly became one of the most innovative post-war British potteries, gaining a reputation as a company that could bridge the gap between mass-produced pottery and artistic, studio pottery.

Robert Jefferson, Leslie Elsden, Guy Sydenham, and Tony Morris were just some of Poole's Art Deco designers that made exquisite art pottery such as the Aegean, Delphis, and Atlantis lines.

Although most of Poole's Art Deco

pottery is sought after today, the Delphis line of pottery, designed by Robert Jefferson and Tony Morris and handpainted by such artisans as Laura, Julia, and Carolyn Wills, may be Poole's most recognized and collected line of pottery. Every piece of Delphis pottery, first offered in 1963, is unique since the decorators themselves often created designs. Delphis has a psychedelic appeal with its vibrant colors and designs that were inspired by famous pop artists, such as Andy Warhol and Jason Pollock.

Other sought after lines of Poole Pottery include Twinstone, Aegean, and Living Glaze.

Collectors since the 1960s have loved Poole Pottery for its range of contemporary shapes, decorated with largely abstract patterns and experimental glazes, making Poole Pottery one of the most avant-garde of mid-century British potteries. Poole Pottery worked in experimental conceptual designs to emerge from a large group of British commercial potteries.

Poole continued producing quality ceramic wares for more than 130 years, until its closing in 2006. However, Poole Pottery wares, including its Art Deco art pieces, are still abundantly found at flea markets, auctions, and boot sales. Many Poole Pottery art pieces sell today in the \$60-75 range, making them affordable to novice collectors.

Collectors who wish to learn more about Poole Pottery may want to do a Poole pilgrimage to the Victoria and Albert Museum in London where a sizable display of Poole's historical wares are on display.

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## A tip of the hat to the artistry of vintage hat molds

Today, labeling one a blockhead suggests they are stupid or dense; but an earlier, now obsolete version of the term defined it as, "a piece of wood in the shape of a head, used as a block for hats or wigs." In the millinery trade, the term blocking refers to shaping material onto a mold, to form the body of the hat. Hat blocks are the molds used in this process. They are usually carved from wood, but you can also find aluminum examples. Hat blocks have been used for more than 200 years.

Early wooden millinery molds or blocks were made perfectly round. That worked well if the hat was to be worn atop a wig. This would be known as a wig block or mold. But, by the early 1800s wigs were beginning to fall out of fashion. Blocks now became more complex, having to conform to the true shape of the wearers' head. So, block-makers became adept in woodcarving techniques to create their hat blocks. This in turn translated into many different styles of blocks, which changed as fashion did, over the years. Although some millinery molds for hats were still made from a single wood block, a number were constructed from several separate pieces. These pieces could be assembled in different configurations to achieve different styles and sizes. These multi-piece examples were called "puzzle blocks." Millinery forms have their own vocabulary that is self-explanatory; crown blocks, a form for making the top portion of a hat; a brim block for just that, making the brim of a hat. And, in many cases headblock stands were used. These offered a more stable platform to create a hat. Without one, it would make the process very difficult.

For more complex millinery forms, a milliner might put together a separate brim block and a crown block, to create a unique shape. Cowboy hats and fedoras are created, using a combination of two blocks. The crown is blocked first, and is then inserted into the brim, which is then blocked. A three-piece puzzle block is employed in making an ascot shape. The center piece is first pulled out, and then the back and front pieces. This keeps the shape of the hat from stretching.

Wooden blocks gave way to aluminum blocks in the 1940s. Aluminum could be used with an electric-powered heat source which helped shape the hat. One was offered on eBay for \$99.

With several millinery-mold makers, turning out hundreds of designs, one would suppose there were thousands of the old-wood block forms available. But, not so. Over time, many molds became

worn and were thrown out; actually, in some cases, they were used as firewood. As with all things, hats eventually went out of fashion.

Some original wooden examples demand higher value due to their artistic qualities. Wooden hat molds can be found ranging from \$30 to several hundred dollars.

A number of millinery mold makers made their marks in the industry. Riva Marchesi was a hat mold maker located in Paris. The company shut its doors in the 1960s. Two Italian artisans, originally from Florence, who settled in Paris before World War I and formed the company. They were the perfect match to make their efforts successful. Riva was a wood carver and Marchesi was a sculptor. The talented pair were mold makers to famous haute-couture fashion houses such as Dior, Givenchy and Lanvin. William Plant & Company was located in Manchester, England, until they ceased operations in 1976. Their contents are now on display at a museum in Stockport. Boon & Taylor was originally a major wood block maker based in Luton, England, later becoming Boon & Lane. Today, they operate making both wood and metal millinery hat molds.

For American hat blocks, whitewoods are most commonly used. European hat blocks are constructed from soft woods. And, in Australia, hard woods were employed in creating hat block molds. But, the most prized hat blocks are from the Kauri tree found in New Zealand. It produces high quality, long-lasting wood which is ideal for hat molds or blocks. This wood is less commonly used today, and Kauri hat blocks are most favored for their quality.

did not create the excitement or brand recognition they desired.

Everything changed in the late-19th century when the development of color lithography revolutionized advertising by providing high quality color printing on paper. The new process quickly gained in popularity, with colorful and vibrant graphics printed on all types of signs.

Mike Eckles is co-owner of Showtime Auctions, along with his wife, Lori. A passionate collector since the age of seven, he became interested in antique advertising signs in the mid-1980s. "This category is one that I love so much and have been involved in for so long," Eckles said, "and I always talk about it as an art form that people can purchase and hang on their wall."

The new process offered up to 14 different colors, and they were incredible – the red ink had gold in it and blue ink had silver in it. Color lithography produced really colorful pieces that would attract customers in the stores. "The more colors, the more graphics, the larger, and the more attention they got." Eckles said.


Companies producing alcohol, tobacco,

firearms, farm machinery, and cola beverages embraced color lithography, recognizing the potential to distinguish themselves from their competitors and become more successful. "They hired the best artists, and the best illustrators in the United States, and took those pictures to the best lithographers in the United States," Eckles said. All of the really great signs, posters and calendars were advertising these products, and those produced between 1880 and 1930 are considered the most desirable and valuable to collectors today.

Their process was simple. Manufacturers would hire an artist to create an original painting that best represented their product and would appeal to buyers of the era. Once it was completed, the company needed space in the piece of art to put their logo and their slogan, and that's where the illustrator came in. They were commissioned to do an illustration of the painting for the company, leaving room in the painting for the logo, slogan, or message. That doesn't mean it wasn't art – but if they added information for the company, they were considered an illustrator, not an artist.

Today, original illustrations bring a lot of money. "I've seen some sell for \$200,000-\$300,000, while some of the original paintings will bring even more money. The

illustrations are valuable but not as much as a piece done as a work of fine art," Eckles said, "it's a fine line though, there are some illustrations that don't leave a lot of room for a logo, and so it's an ongoing argument as to whether it's an illustration or a piece of art."

Much of this early advertising was directed toward men. Advertising signs reflected the lifestyle, dreams and values of America at the time.

While a lot of companies used children in advertising, including ads for tobacco and alcohol, the high-dollar signs are generally the ones depicting nude or scantily clad women.

There were a lot of nude women used in advertising signs, especially pieces designed to hang in a saloon. Showtime has sold saloon signs with nude women for \$25,000 but by contrast, one with a child would expect to sell for \$1,000.

According to Eckles, the most important factors in the selling price of advertising art are condition and aesthetics. "In the '70s and '80s, rarity was extremely important to collectors, and if they knew there were only three or four in existence, they would buy it no matter what the condition. As collecting moved into the '90s and early-21st century, condition became much more important. Today, people investing on a piece of art for the wall won't even look at a sign with damage, no matter how rare it is."

Among the top sellers from Showtime Auctions is a Buffalo Brewing Company round sign, circa 1910, that sold in 2008 for \$57,500. This pre-prohibition tin sign is known as a "charger" and would have been located in a prominent place in a saloon. The sign features a stunning image of a woman considered to be one of the most beautiful ever used on a sign. Measuring 28 inches in diameter, including the frame, the tin sign is in mint condition with absolutely no damage whatsoever.

In 2006, Showtime sold a rare tin Davy Crockett cigar sidewalk sign for \$33,000. One of only four known, the image of a young boy with a smoking cigar clamped

firmly in his mouth, sits above Crockett's well-known motto: "Be sure you're right. Then go ahead."


In 2007, Eckles made the news when he predicted that antique advertising signs would sell for over \$100,000 in the next 10 years. In 2010 he was in the news again, when Showtime sold a Rock Island Railroad reverse glass sign for \$165,000, setting a record price for an advertising sign at the time.

Another top seller was an advertising sign for Campbell's Soup. The sign was originally withdrawn following consumer complaints that it 'disgraced the flag' and is now only one of 10 known to have survived. Created circa 1900, the sign sold for \$52,000 in 2013.

Breweriana signs are popular with younger American men, and according to Eckles, are one of the stronger categories of advertising signs. A signed produced by the National Brewing Company, circa 1905, sold for \$9,000 in 2010. Produced in the glory days of color lithography, this sign is only one of three known to exist. The pre-prohibition sign with its desirable and eye-catching graphics and vibrant color would have sold for far more, however its value was affected by issues such as paint flaking and wrinkles.

Another breweriana sign is a Miller High Life Brew produced after the peak of color lithography. It sold for \$2,500 in 2015. Produced in Milwaukee, Wis., circa 1940, this tin over cardboard sign is in excellent condition, featuring striking graphics and bright colors that would grab attention when hung on a wall. However, it is a post-prohibition piece, and there are several known to exist. It would make a good choice for a new collector or someone with limited funds to invest.



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

## East Meets West to offer diversity at Oakridge

ASHBURN, Va. — From Betty Boop's dog Bimbo to the Hindu Goddess Parvati, Oakridge Auction Gallery will indeed have something for everyone at its East Meets West auction June 7-8. There will be a gallery preview exhibition open to the public Wednesday, June 5 through Friday, June 7 from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m.

Bimbo will be offered in three different colors: Green, red and orange. The figures all feature articulated limbs and are marked "Bimbo DES & Copyright by Fleischer Studios." The bronze figure of the Hindu Goddess Parvati measures 20 inches tall and dates from the 1950s. It is from the collection of Hollywood and Broadway set designer Robert Gundlach.

Other highlights include European and American porcelain such as Rookwood, Meissen, Royal Copenhagen and Rozenburg; sterling silver by Tiffany & Co, S. Kirk & Son and McAuliffe Hadley; and custom designed jewelry in 18K and 14K gold and platinum with gemstones including Baume & Mercier and Rolex timepieces.

Besides the Bimbo figures, the selection of toys and miniatures includes a CIJ Alfa Romeo P2 toy car; hand-made Jan Gilmer 1/4 scale gas midget car; Garton Hot Rod pedal car and a Kingsbury steel monoplane.

Among the international selections are an oil-on-canvas painting by Indonesian artist Arie Smit (Dutch-Indonesian, 1916-2016). The oil on canvas painting depicts Balinese boats under trees, with original wood frame, circa 1960s. Smit is known for his paintings of Bali. He studied at the Academy of Arts in Rotterdam, Netherlands and afterwards joined the Royal Netherlands East Indies Army. He was captured by the Japanese military during World War II and spent several years in forced

labor. Upon his release in 1945, he entered the Republic of Indonesia and gained Indonesian citizenship. He lived in Bali until his death in 2016.

Other highlights include a selection of 18th to 20th century Japanese woodblock prints; Persian illuminated manuscripts; Indonesian decorative arts; Chinese Export and Japanese porcelain and bronze items; jade, cloisonné, and jewelry; Korean ceramics from the 7th to the 20th centuries; Hindu Temple carvings from India collected in the 1950s; musical instruments including guitars and a Lyon & Healy harp.

# Frazetta work sets records for Heritage at \$5.4 million

CHICAGO—Another day, another record Frazetta sale.

On May 16, the Chicago branch of Heritage Auctions sold Frank Frazetta's 1969 fantasy painting entitled *Egyptian Queen* for \$5.4 million to a bidder who has chosen to remain anonymous. This easily eclipses the previous Frazetta record of \$1.79 million paid for *Death Dealer 6*, which Heritage sold in May of 2018.


The *Egyptian Queen* sale was not only the highest price ever realized for a Frazetta work, it set a house record as the most expensive item ever sold by Heritage, beating the 2016 sale of a luxury Dallas estate by nearly half a million dollars.

One of Frazetta's best-known paintings, *Egyptian Queen* is a striking image revered for its dynamism, color, lighting, ornate column, mysterious central character, and overall magnificence. It originally appeared as the cover of a mass market comic book magazine, *Eerie #23*, issued by Warren Publishing in 1969. In subsequent years, Frazetta reprinted the painting as a very popular poster and print that hung in dorm rooms, bedrooms, and comic book stores all over the country.

According to Heritage Auctions Vice President Todd Hignite, the sale of *Egyptian Queen*, which had been in the Frazetta family since its creation 50 years ago, puts Frazetta in fine company. In a press release, he said, "This result elevates Frank Frazetta's art into the stratosphere of visual narrative art on a par with the likes of Norman Rockwell, Maxfield Parrish, and other luminaries."

"Frazetta was a technical master," added Roberta Kramer, Managing Director for Chicago Heritage, in a phone interview. "He's considered a godfather or grandfather of the fantasy genre — however you want to put it."

Over the past couple of decades — the

last few years in particular — fantasy, science fiction, and comic book art has skyrocketed in value. It is now chic to be geek, and Kramer believes she knows why.

"Geek culture is more popular because there's so much more of it," she said. "The internet probably has a good deal to do with it. A lot of stuff that is science fiction has come to pass, and we have all of this technology. Being a geek about it is cool."

This is in direct contrast to when Kramer was younger.

"Decades ago, you didn't dare tell anyone you went to high school with that you read comics," she said. "You would have gotten stuffed into a locker. The kids who were way into fantasy and science fiction were considered nerds. Always picked last for dodge ball, and they certainly didn't date cheerleaders. My son who is in his 20s says it's cool to be a geek."

## Two paintings drive bidding at Cordier auction

HARRISBURG, Pa. – Two oil paintings from the same private collection streaked past their high estimates to bring top lot status during Cordier's Spring Fine & Decorative Arts Auction on May 11.

The paintings had been in the same collection for generations. Their fresh-to-the-market status likely helped drive final bids.

"The wide range selection brought top lots in every category across the board,"


said Melanie Hartman, Cordier's appraiser and Specialty Auctions Director. "We had a good crowd with 180 registered room bidders. The elevation of Frazetta to a master and the high prices realized for his paintings has had an enormous impact on the sales of similar art, particularly the works of such fantasists as Ken Kelly, Boris Vallejo, and Jeffrey Jones.

"We often see that when a genre of painting starts to take off in terms of popularity and in terms of auction prices, other good artists in that genre will also start to climb and increase in value," Kramer said. "Now that the Frazettas are getting out of most people's reach, the collecting public and the people who are interested start finding other artists who are very good, but aren't necessarily a household name. As they say, the rising tide lifts all ships."

was signed in Cyrillic by Russian artist Arnold Borisovich Lakhovsky (1880-1937). The colossal painting, dated 1910, stood over 5 feet tall and nearly 4 feet wide and was mounted in a white painted gesso frame decorated with rose buds. The work commanded \$55,200, far surpassing the high estimate of \$5,000.


The second painting, an oil on board by Arthur Fitzwilliam Tait (British/American 1819-1905), was titled *Pointer and Quails* and realized \$33,600, over-reaching the estimate of \$8,000 to \$10,000. It was signed "A.F. Tait N.Y. 1863" and, as the title suggests, portrayed a brown pointer with a white blazed face and chest confronting three quails in a tall grass field. The overall framed measurements were 14 ½ inches high by 18 ½ inches wide.

Native American artifacts collectors had much to appreciate at this auction. Aggressive bidding for a Crow Indian lazy stitch fully beaded blanket strip drove the realized price past an estimate of \$200 to \$400 to a staggering \$21,600. The strip, circa 1880 to 1910, measured 5 feet long and had a blue beaded ground with white, red, yellow, pink, and green geometric designs and cross rosettes. The catalog noted, "Good example of Reservation Era blanket strip," and had a consignor's statement that the piece had been obtained by her great-grandfather while vacationing in Wolf, Wyo., at Eaton's Ranch in the late 19th century.

A Plains Indian bag, possibly from the Oto tribe, circa 1890-1910, had a free-hand floral motif on the tasseled bag that had two finely beaded drawstring ties. The piece had been collected by Theodore Kepner Long and then gifted to the Carson Long Military Academy. The bag measured 20 inches long by 7½ inches wide and achieved \$19,200. Long (1856-1947) was the publisher of the *Mandan Pioneer* who went on to become a States Attorney for lands west of the Missouri River in 1885 and Attorney for N.P.R.R. Bismark North Dakota in 1887. He returned to his homeland of

Pennsylvania and founded Carson Long Military Academy in 1914.

A Lakota Sioux knife sheath and Strike-A-Lite bag, which also hailed from Long's collection brought \$14,400. The knife sheath had a blue ground with typical red and yellow geometrics and tin cones. The beaded bag, also with tin cones, was used to hold flint and steel for making fire.

For those looking for jewelry a platinum 2.46 carat diamond solitaire ring with an Old European cut diamond (Clarity VS-2, Color I) sold for \$14,400.


Among the impressive items that sold in the \$1,000 price range was an Art Deco three-panel room screen. This highly presentational piece was made in the Erte style and portrayed three women on the front panels with a solid black backing. The women were elegantly dressed in full length gowns of gold, black, and off white. The screen measured 80 inches wide by 60 inches tall and sold for \$1,080.

A bronze sculpture depicting a jockey mounted on a racehorse was an outstanding rendition done in precision and accurate detail. The work, measuring 26 inches long by 22 ½ inches high and mounted on a marble base, was inscribed R.A. De Luca. It more than doubled the high estimate of \$400, selling for \$960.

The furniture section also offered interesting and unusual pieces. A large 19th century French Napoleon III style two-door cabinet had a rich ebony finish that was accented with patinated metal mounts, band inlay, and silveroid cherub mounts. Each door was centered by an oval shaped silver disc decoration. The 53 inch wide by 43 inch high cabinet had been purchased by the consignor's parents at an auction near Versailles, France in the 1950s. This standout piece also sold for \$1,680.





The written message is "Hi y'all / Nicole / Thank you so much very / much for watching 'The / Dukes of Hazzard' and / caring for Enos and Sonny/ Schroyer! I care for you! / Love and May God Bless, / Sonny [smile symbol]. The postcard is postmarked "VALDOSTA, GA / Feb 4 / PM / 1984 / 316." There is damage and some surface paper loss in the lower left corner of the front. Does my childhood treasure have any value?

The postcard has no financial value. It obviously has emotional and sentimental value to you. This is a stock publicity postcard. The surface image and the text are printed. "Nicole" written after the "Y'all" and the address are the only non-printed portions of the card.

The Dukes of Hazzard, a television action-comedy, aired on CBS from Jan. 25, 1979 to Feb. 6, 1985. A total of 147 episodes spread over seven seasons were produced.

variety of reasons among which were the customized 1969 Dodge Charger that belonged to the Dukes and Catherine Bach's Daisy Duke character, sexy and sensuous at the time and politically incorrect in the 21st centu-

Shroyer was born in Valdosta on Aug. 28, 1935, which may explain the postmark. He was written out of The Dukes of Hazzard at the end of the third season and given his own show Enos in 1980. It was cancelled after 18 episodes.

If in fine or better condition, your postcard has a value between \$3 and \$5. Shroyer still is alive and maintains his own website www.sonnyshroyeronline.com.

I recently acquired a clown cookie jar. The clown is wearing a pale blue jester's hat and has a pale blue clown costume. The cookie jar measures



13-inches tall and has no markings. Can you identify the maker and provide me with more information?

It would be great if the axiom "seek and ye shall find" applied to identifying antiques and collectibles. The closest antiques and collectibles axiom is "if you look long enough, chances are that you may find the answer." After a great deal of looking, I did identify the maker of your cookie jar.

In the old days, I would have pulled three or four cookie jar reference books off my library shelf and paged through them looking for a match to the illustration that accompanied your email. Today, I log-in to WorthPoint.com, identify the main category (in this case, ceramics), and type in a reasonable search line. I used "Clown cookie jar" and selected "Ceramics." More than 500 listings appeared. Starting with the first and selecting 100 listings per page view, I finally found your cookie jar on the second page. The jar had a different paint scheme. I kept looking and eventually found one with an identical paint scheme to the jar you own.

When World War I interrupted the importation of German Kewpie dolls, the American Bisque Co., located in Williamstown, W.Va., was founded in 1919 to supply the continued American demand for Kewpies. B. E. Allen, a part owner of the Sterling China Co., purchased the American Bisque Co. in 1922. The Allen family owned the company until it ceased operations in

American Bisque introduced its cookie jar line in the 1930s. The jars feature novelty designs that included popular cartoon characters as well as animals and figures. The brightly colored, cheerful jars were an instant hit.

Al Dye and Louis Bauer, daughter of the designer Walter Bauer, designed cookie jars for American Bisque. Working as a freelance designer, Bauer's American Bisque cookie jars included a cat, clown, Donald Duck, Pip, and Thumper.

The 1980s and 1990s cookie jar collecting craze is past history. The sec-The show became a cult classic for a ondary market took a major price hit during the 2008-2009 Great Recession. Looking at recent sale histories for the American Bisque clown cookie jar, the average sell through price is around

In 2005, Donald Trump signed **A** an agreement with Drinks America to market Trump Vodka. The sales slogan was "Success Distilled." As usual, Trump claimed his Vodka would outsell Grey Goose and a T&T (Trump and tonic) would become the most popular cocktail in America. Neither happened.

In 2007, Drinks America signed a deal to export 50,000 cases of Trump Vodka annually to Russia. Drinks America discontinued production in 2011, due in part to the high cost of the gold leaf labels. Trump Vodka was subject to several lawsuits, one of which resulted in the destruction of 5,000 mini-bottles in a furnace. Trump Vodka is still sold in Israel by H. Pixel International. It is extremely popular, especially around Passover.

A WorthPoint.com search by "Sale Date" reveals sell through prices that are inconsistent. Empty liter bottles sell between \$10 and \$90. Full bottles bring between \$250 and \$350. Apparently, there also were Trump Orange and Trump Raspberry vodkas.

What does all this prove? The answer is that "Rinker's 30 Year Rule"-for the first 30 years of anything's life, all its value is speculative—is in play. Given the above numbers, this is the time to sell not to buy. In 25 years, current prices will be dreams rather than reality.

There is a blue "T" at the top of nature. You have written in the nast about collector's etiquette My question is a general and touched on seller's etiquette. I do not remember reading anything about buyer's etiquette. My hypothetical scenario involves a garage sale. As you shop a garage sale, an object catches your eye. It could be a piece of furniture, a lamp, an old tin toy, a work of art, or jewelry. The piece is marked \$25 but you know its true secondary market retail worth is 10 times that or more. Does the buyer have a moral obligation to educate the seller as to the true value of the object or is the buyer within his rights to pay the \$25 and walk away? Does it make any difference if the seller is a person who clearly needs the income?

> The IRS defines a fair price as having three parts: (1) a willing buyer and willing seller; (2) neither under the compulsion to buy or sell; and (3) both equally knowledgeable. This definition usually fails when the second and third criteria is put to the test.

> Garage/yard sales are the exception to the rule. As long as the buyer does not hold himself/herself out to be an antiques/collectibles expert, he/she is free to pay the asking price and walk away. There have been several court rulings supporting the concept that a garage/yard sale seller has no right to assume that those attending the sale are experts. Each person who attends is a member of the general public.

> Although the law protects the buyer, your question is whether there is a moral obligation for a knowledgeable buyer to level the playing field. In an ideal world, the answer is yes. In the real world, the answer is no.

> There is no universally agreed upon and enforceable ethical/moral code in the antiques and collectibles trade. Each person in the trade is responsible for developing his/her own.

> When anonymously visiting a garage/yard sale and seeing an object that is badly underpriced, my recommendation is to pay the full price. Do not bargain. It is not fair to kick a person when he is down. I have seen plenty of dealers I know violate this rule both at garage/yard sales and other sale venues.

> There is nothing to prevent you from paying more if you wish. Do what your conscience dictates. You are the one who has to look in the mirror after the sale. If you do not like what you see, then you did wrong. Otherwise, move

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
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
